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Racial Equity Forum is a Call to Action By Monica Bastardo, MU Trinity Fellow, Dominican Center

Nearly 200 residents participated in a panel on the topic of race at the Dominican Center's Racial Equity Forum on February 3rd. A diverse group of panelists shared historical, academic, statistical and personal perspectives on the topic of race, led by moderator Angela Russell of **CUNA Mutual Group in** Madison. Her presentation, "Taking on Racial Equity", defined equity and how various forms of bias can inhibit one's ability to act equitably. Russell said "Equity is just and fair inclusion into a society in



which all, including all racial and ethnic groups, can participate, prosper, and reach their full potential. Equity gives all people a just and fair shot in life, despite historic patterns of exclusion." Russell taught how to identify bias and encouraged attendees to have a healthy curiosity for learning about others as a necessary foundation for dismantling the systems and structures of inequity in homes, work places and the community.

Following Russell's presentation, other panelists and the audience brought important perspectives to the conversation and reflected on the troubling issue of racial equity. Panelists included Dennis Walton, an Amani resident and Outreach Coordinator for the Fatherhood Initiative; Dr. Veronica Gunn, of Children's Hospital of Wisconsin; Susan Lloyd, of the Zilber Family Foundation; Deanna Singh, of the Burke Foundation; and Patricia Rogers, of the Dominican Center. The room bustled with ideas and energy for action.

The forum sparked determination for action that can create a more equitable world. Katie Sanders noted "I have been in a lot of conversations about race relations/racial equity, and none have been so productive and inspiring. After the session last week, I really felt like I could make a difference...It's often difficult for me to leave conversations like that feeling good about the world, but last week's forum was able to show me some hope, and helped me see that I can make a difference. And I will."

Another attendee, COA's Sasha Fernandez said "It was an informative discussion and the choice of panelists was key to a powerful highlight of the awareness that is needed. Their professional and personal perspective was steadfast and engaging...I believe we are definitely on the right path to help empower and engage people of color. Systemic oppression does not have to be the reality that our younger generations face. In the great words of Deanna Singh, 'Let us focus on our assets, re-brand our city, take action!"

"Portal" to Create Conversations on Criminal Justice



What is that big gold container next to the COA Goldin Center? It's part of a global project designed to create new perspectives through face-to-face video conversations between people who may never have met. The portal in Milwaukee will connect you with a resident in New Jersey for a video conversations. The project is a collaboration between artist and creator/organizer of the portal program, Amar Bakshi, and major research

universities including Yale and Rutgers. Amar Bakshi's organization Shared Studios states "Our hope is to create a safe space for meaningful dialogues on how people understand their safety, the police, and the system of laws they live within."

Bakshi went on to say "Shared Studios is honored and excited to be partnering with COA Youth & Family Centers, The Milwaukee Fatherhood Initiative and Pepp Nation, among a number of other local groups, to bring the Portal to the Amani community and the broader Milwaukee public. We're particularly happy to be working alongside so many dynamic community leaders and organizations who ultimately will program the Portal for domestic dialogues on safety and justice, and global dialogues on a wide range of issues."

Beginning on Wednesday, April 20, dialogues about criminal justice will take place from 1-5 p.m. Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. Every twenty minutes a different individual (must be 18 or older) will enter the portal and discuss a subject such as "When you think of Ferguson, what comes to mind? Or "How would you describe your neighborhood and your relationship with local police to a stranger?"
